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["buy something to us" or "buy something for us"](#)

What did you buy? is a question we'd be more likely to ask if we knew the person had gone off with a view to buying certain specified things. What have you bought bought is ...

I've been curious for a while as to the meaning of a phrase from a song I like. Could someone please tell me what "I'd sooner buy" means or refers to in this context? "I'd ...

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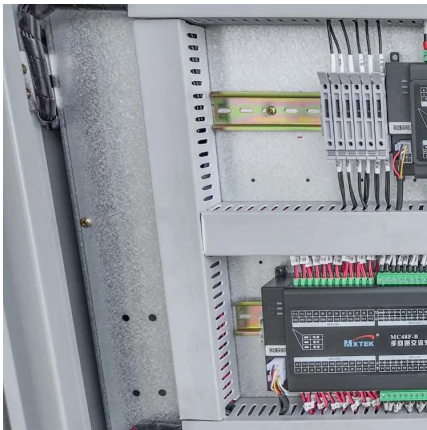




[He buy or He buys \(present subjunctive\)](#)
